IN MEMORIAM

DONALD C. DICKSON, 1890-1964

Donald Coty Dickson was born February 28, 1890 in his native city of Shreveport, Louisiana and died on Sunday, August 23, 1964 in his home city.

Donald Dickson was a practicing attorney in Shreveport for more than fifty years. He graduated in law at Tulane University in 1914 and thereafter formed a partnership with James A. Denny, a college-mate, and they practiced in Shreveport under the firm name of Dickson & Denny until the death of Mr. Denny, after which Donald Dickson continued to practice alone until his death.

Mr. Dickson was a member of a prominent family of Caddo Parish. His father was the late George Bennett Dickson of Greenwood, Louisiana, and his mother was Lucille Coty of Bossier Parish. His parents held considerable property adjoining Shreveport and their old home on Stoner Avenue was a landmark for many years as a traditional ante-bellum residence, and the home of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Coty Dickson on Wyandotte Street now stands on a part of a plantation which was formerly owned by the ancestors of Mr. Dickson, and Highland Park of the City of Shreveport, between Wyandotte and Olive Streets, also occupies a part of this same plantation.

Donald, as we all knew him, enjoyed life to the fullest extent. He had many most estimable and admirable traits of character. He was a perpetual optimist and radiated optimism among his friends and acquaintances. He loved the outdoors, loved to fish and hunt and took delight in sharing his knowledge as well as fishing and hunting trips with his friends. He was not the type of lawyer to seek the plaudits of the public, but enjoyed a practice where he could help and assist the average citizen in his troubles and problems. He loved people and nothing suited him better than to help others.

He was a great lover of flowers and had a flower garden at his home and took much pleasure in seeking out unusual and beautiful flowers, and replanting them in his own garden.

He will be greatly missed by the bar, the judiciary of Shreveport, and his many laymen friends.

Donald Lickson was survived by his wife, Adeline Scanland Jeter whom he married on October 11, 1916, and his four children, two sons, Donald C. Dickson, Jr. of San Antonio, Texas, and Warrick Jeter Dickson of Lake Charles; two daughters, Mrs. William R. Eubank of Kansas City, Missouri, and Mrs. Keth Cooper of Lake Charles, Louisiana. He was also survived by eight grandchildren.

Like many of us who have passed the age of threescore and ten, Donald had been among us so long that he seemed to be a permanent fixture in our minds. He was only recently honored in being invited to and attending a second graduation at Tulane University in honor of his fifty years of practice. He was a lifelong member of the First Baptist Church and had been a board member of that institution. He was a member of the Louisiana and Shreveport Bar Associations and enjoyed a friendship and acquaintances among the legal fraternity throughout the state.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Shreveport Bar and Judiciary at this meeting assembled, in these memorial exercises go on record as sincerely regretting his sudden death and in extending to his widow and family our most heartfelt sympathy in their bereavement.



be sent to the widow and family.




