RESOLUTION

In the passing of George Thurber on February 2, 1947, the Bar of Shreveport and of the State of Louisiana has lost one of its best and most useful personalities.

Possessed of a keen and analytical mind and of a calm and judicial temperament, Mr. Thurber was recognized as being one of the leading attorneys of the Bar.

Mr. Thurber came to Shreveport at the turn of the century, and became a member of the Shreveport Ber in 1909. In addition to being an efficient lawyer, Mr. Thurber occupied positions of bonor and trust in the Parish of Gadde and the City of Shreveport. In 1912 he was elected a member of the Police Jury of Gadde Parish, which position he resigned on December 10, 1914, to take his seat as Commissioner of Public Safety on the City Council of Shreveport, Louisians, in which position he served his term of four years.

In both of these positions he had the respect and confidence of the people, and his policies and decisions universally met with the concurrence and commendation of the citizens of the Parish and City.

Here in New Orleans on Movember 15, 1879, he was educated in Santa Fe, New Mexico, and as part of his education he acquired the ability to read and fluently speak the Spanish language. He was also well versed in French, and could speak and write that language with case.

In both his public and private life Mr. Thurber was essentially honest. Indeed, honesty and a spirit of fairness were smong his most dominant traits of character.
