Your Committee appointed to present a memorial on
the death of the late Albert Lister Alexander begs leave to present
the following:

IN MEMORIAM

It was with a great deal of sadness that the Shreveport Bar
learned of the death of Albert Lister Alexander, who died at his
home in Shreveport, Louisiana, on December 4, 1947.

Albert Lister Alexander was born in Shreveport, Louisiana, on
May 11, 1886, the son of Taliaferro Alexander and Laura (Lister)
Alexander. To this union there were born six children, of whom
Albert Lister Alexander was the last survivor.

Albert Lister Alexander was the member of a family long dis-
tinguished at the Bench and Bar of Louisiana. His father, Taliaferro
Alexander was a nephew of James G. Taliaferro, famous Louisiana
lawyer and jurist, who served as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court
of Louisiana. Taliaferro Alexander practiced law from 1871 to 1924,
a period of 53 years, and was recognized as a leader of the
Louisiana Bar.

Albert Lister Alexander, after finishing public school, attended
Louisiana State University, and in 1907 was graduated with the
degree of Bachelor of Laws from the University of Virginia. He was
admitted to practice before the Courts of Louisiana in the year 1908.
For many years after his graduation, he practiced in the law offices
of his father, first under the firm name of Alexander and Wilkinson,
until 1919, and subsequently with his father under the firm name of
Alexander & Alexander. For many years he was an active practitioner
in this State and conducted himself ably and honorably as a lawyer
and as a respected citizen. During the latter years of his life,
he retired from active court practice and concerned himself with
the representation of a few old clients, but mainly with managing
his extensive personal estate. Albert Lister Alexander bore among
all of his friends and acquaintances a reputation for honesty and
truthfulness which earned for him the admiration and respect of all
who knew him.

On August 11, 1911, he married Mary O'Brien, a native of Virginia.
His death was accelerated by the loss of his wife who, herself, died
within the year of his passing.

By the death of Albert Lister Alexander, the Shreveport Bar was
deprived of a man who, through his practice and conduct as a lawyer,
reflected only credit upon himself and upon it.

IT IS RESOLVED, therefore, that this resolution be presented to
the District Court of Caddo Parish for recordation on the minutes of
the Court, in memory of our deceased brother, and that a copy be
sent to the bereaved family.
