IN MEMORIAM

SYLVIAN WILLER GAMM

October 28th, 1909 - January 4th, 1966

Sylvian Willer Gamm was born at Belcher, Louisiana, on October 28, 1909, the son of Julius and Rosa W. Gamm. He died at San Antonio, Texas, while temporarily away from his home, on January 4, 1966.

Sylvian W. Gamm moved to Shreveport, Louisiana, at the age of seven and received his elementary education in the public schools of this city. After graduation from High School, he attended Washington University, later matriculated at Tulane University, and received his Bachelor of Laws Degree in 1933 from that institution. While a student in the Tulane College of Law he was appointed to the Board of Editors of the Tulane Law Review.

On July 14, 1933, Sylvian W. Gamm was admitted to the Bar and shortly thereafter entered into the private practice of law in Shreveport, Louisiana. The practice of law to him was not only a means of livelihood, but a labor of love. He respected and cherished the law for it is through the law that man obtains and retains his rights, whether to property or to liberty.

Sylvian W. Gamm was a man of many interests, for not only was he an active practitioner of the law, a cattleman and a farmer, he was also a devotee to many cultural and philanthropical causes. He was past President of the Shreveport Jewish Federation as well as the B'Nai Zion Congregation of Shreveport. He was a member of the American, Louisiana and Shreveport Bar Associations.


